Female students dismiss bullying for causing long-lasting psychological effects

Schools and parents join hands to combat bullying

The Salama Council held a session with the female students from Nad Al Hammer School - Cycle 2 emphasising the role of schools and parents in addressing bullying, which is an aggressive behaviour that causes long-term psychological and social effects. The students also discussed the causes of (school bullying), which includes unacceptable comments, exploiting the weaknesses of some students' personalities, and bragging about their social or academic level without taking into account the feelings of the victim or the effects resulting from the abuse through neglect and exclusion.

The students talked about the types of school bullying that female teachers are exposed to, or it may be behaviour or verbalization from female teachers directed at female students, stressing that they reject bullying in all its forms because it is uncivilized behaviour and does not express human values.

The participating students also explained that they were subjected to bullying, and they succeeded in confronting it and stopping the bullying party by submitting formal complaints to the school administration and following the method of advice and guidance to stop practicing psychological or physical abuse on them.



Eighth-grade student,

Mirna also explained that students should choose their friends in the neighbourhood and schoolmates well, and stay away from strangers or older people. Bullies choose victims at random.





The role of family

Eighth-grader, **Mira Mahmoud**, said: The family plays an important role in combating bullying by educating children to respect others, refraining from humiliating people and promoting tolerance, regardless of differences in colour, race, or language.

"Parents have an important role in educating children and strengthening their personalities so that they do not fall victim to bullies. It requires encouraging children to participate in school and sports activities, and motivating children to watch cultural programmes and avoid violent movies," she added.

As for **Amna Atef**, a student in the to organize workshops and lectures that educate students about the importance of their authority and power over the pledge on the bully.

The role of the school

Alyazia Yahya, a fifth-grade student, said: "The school has a big and important role in treating bullying, through the role of the teacher when bullying occurs, and her role is to stop bullying and prevent the stronger party from practicing assault and warn him of any unacceptable behavior.

The teacher also has a fundamental role in helping the victim. Through listening and providing psychological and educational support to get the student out of the state of fear and distress.

Respectful Treatment

Eighth-grade student, Marwa Jaber called on teachers and students to observe the principle of Respectful Treatment. "Islam urges everyone to respect the elderly and be kind to the young. Based on this principle, the teacher must set an example to follow on how to deal with students and avoid bullying behaviours that may be unintended, especially towards academicallyweak students," she remarked.

Protecting students and preserving the rights of teachers

Ms Maitha Al Sayah, Security, Safety and Health Executive at Nad Al Hammer School - Cycle 2 said, "Bullying is an aggressive conduct and a social problem that many groups suffer from. Among the most dangerous types of bullying is school bullying, which requires great efforts and intensive awareness programmes to combat it through education and cooperation and respect.


"Bullying has various forms, such as physical, verbal, electronic, social, and each form requires a specific approach to the solution. The key to addressing it is having open communication, safeguarding the rights of the victims, empowering them to take their rights, enabling them to combat bullying, and advising them to be transparent with parents and the school in the event of repeated bullying or abuse. Additionally, more efforts should be made to provide psychological and social support to the victim such that he or she turns into a positive individual who embraces diversity and contributes to community building the community."

The Smart kiosks are situated at various locations, including RTA's main building as well as customer service centres in Umm Ramool, Deira, Al Barsha, Al Tawar, Tasjeel Al Barsha, JBR, Al Aweer, Al Manara, Al Karama, Tasieel Al Ousais, Wasel Belhasa, Quick Registration, and Shamel Al Muhaisnah.

The Smart kiosks offer a range of services that include driving license renewal, seasonal parkina card renewal, vehicle license renewal. fine inquiries and payments, vehicle certificate printing. document receipt, issuance of vehicle registration, and replacement of damaged/lost vehicle registration.



The smart kiosk enables customers to conveniently complete transactions without in-person assistance from staff. Additionally, the kiosk is equipped with a camera and telephone to promptly provide audio and video assistance to users in case of any procedural or technical issues.

These kiosks offer a range of services, including the issuance of "To Whom It May Concern" certificates relating to licensing matters, inquiry and payment of fines as well as the renewal and replacement of lost or damaged driving licenses and vehicle registration.


